You will notice an increase in the numbers for SFYs 2022-2023 from SFYs 2021-2022. All DV programs are operating at 100% capacity. DV Programs are sheltering both on-site and in hotels/motels. Whether on-site are in hotels/motels clients are receiving the same services such as individual counseling, group counseling, and employment assistance. The service contacts were conducted by face to face on-site visits.
