

## Domestic Violence Numbers for the Past Five State Fiscal Years

State Fiscal Year (SFY) = July 1 of first year listed through June 30 of second year listed

**You will notice an increase in the numbers for SFYs 2022-2023 from SFYs 2021-2022. All DV programs are operating at 100% capacity. DV Programs are sheltering both on-site and in hotels/motels. Whether on-site are in hotels/motels clients are receiving the same services such as individual counseling, group counseling, and employment assistance. The service contacts were conducted by face to face on-site visits.**

- \*\* Domestic violence programs provide services to victims of domestic violence that can, but doesn't have to, include emergency shelter. Currently, all domestic violence programs funded through SCDSS include emergency shelter. Some programs have more than one shelter site. Other services include, but are not limited to, counseling, legal aid, transportation, and employment assistance.
- \*\*\* Reflects the number of unduplicated adults and children served by providers. (Unduplicated=unique individuals)
- \*\*\*\* Residential and Non-Residential Counseling services, including individual and group counseling sessions. There has been a significant increase in the number of individuals receiving emergency shelter and number of individuals receiving additional services due to the domestic violence crisis and the systemic barriers to housing access.

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
