

adoption preservation

The Department of Social Services Adoption Preservation Program understands that adoption affects families in many different ways. Sometimes families experience difficulties even after the adoption has finalized. We are aware that you may need support and services.

Available Services

- Information and Referral Families often need information regarding adoption issues, child development, medical problems, community resources and financial issues. Families may request, or the Adoption Preservation Specialist may suggest, referrals to other agencies or professionals for further assistance.
- Case Management Families may want regular contact with an Adoption Preservation Specialist to help them through a difficult time. The family and the specialist determine what ongoing services may be needed, and a plan is developed.
- Advocacy Children and families sometimes need help in explaining to others the issues affecting their family. Adoption Preservation Specialists may be available to attend meetings or staffings or simply make a telephone call with you or for you.
- Education Adoption Preservation Specialists are aware of issues in the educational system affecting children identified with special needs. Parents are connected with agencies that provide training, information and other related parent support services. An Adoption Preservation Specialist may be included in an Individualized Education Program (IEP) staffing.

- Therapy The Adoption Preservation Specialist will assist you in finding local therapeutic resources that have experience with adoption issues.
- Respite Respite is a short break from the hard work of family building. Respite can range from a few hours to a few days depending on the need. The agency may be able to help with the cost. Contact your Adoption Preservation Specialist.
- Parent Mentoring Parents can be connected with other parents who have been through similar situations and circumstances to offer support to one another.
- Support Groups A support group is composed of adoptive families. For some families, this is their only way to share with other people who have the same problems. Contact your Adoption Preservation Specialist to assist you with more information regarding support groups offered through The Department of Social Services and other agencies.
- Crisis Intervention Parents may contact the agency when they are in crisis and need immediate support to get through a bad time or need help while making a difficult decision.
- Family Retreats Family camps, retreats and weekend excursions are offered throughout the year by various agencies. Contact your Adoption Preservation Specialist for more information.
